Some Consequences:



Investor-state Dispute Settlement (ISDS) allows foreign firms to attack laws that protect the environment, citizen's health, and jobs.



Corporations are allowed to challenge laws that ban environmentally destructive practices.



Expanded intellectual property rights (IPR) make medicines more expensive.



Expanded IPR eliminate online privacy of citizens.



Employers will be more empowered and motivated to outsource and reduce wages in Northern and Southern countries.



IPR restrict farmers from cultivating, exchanging and selling their own
